

## BRICKBATS FOR POLICE AT AGM

A full house greeted Robert Chambers, Chair of Essex Police Authority, when he addressed LRA's AGM on 16 October. Mr Chambers, accompanied by the Chief Executive of Essex Police Authority and Inspector Andy Loveridge of Loughton Police Station, was left in no doubt of residents' disquiet about the performance of Essex Police since they took over Loughton from the Met.

After some general introductory remarks Mr Chambers took a barrage of questions and comments from the floor, mainly centred on the invisibility of the police and their lack of action when contacted by the public. Many concrete examples were given of police failure to act, poor service from Loughton Police Station and a lamentable attitude to calls. It was pointed out strongly that this could eventually lead to a lack of cooperation with the police from law-abiding residents. Mr Chambers' emphasis that residents who contacted the police wanted to feel comforted was met with derision – callers were looking for action, not comforting words.

Mr Chambers detailed what was already being done by the Essex Police

Authority. The number of police officers was being increased year on year. The number of Community Support Officers was also being increased and these would always be based in the local community, giving a visible police presence. A rise in the number of civilian support workers would reduce the burden of paperwork on police officers.

He was aware that there were problems with the telephone system and these would be addressed, although he gave no time scale.

The Chief Executive took notes of the issues raised during the meeting and Mr Chambers promised to look into all the complaints and offered to return at a future date to give a progress report on improvements made. LRA will definitely be taking up his offer. *Carol Murray*

## POLICE *continued from page one.*

Some of these points had also been raised at the Loughton Police Community Forum on 24 September, where Insp Andy Loveridge spoke about crime trends across the section over the past 12 months. Incidents of burglary and vehicle crime are down on the previous year, however anti-social behaviour and criminal damage have increased, which is also reflected nationally. New powers allowing police to seize vehicles that are causing a nuisance have been introduced this year. Officers are also able to issue fixed penalty notices for anti-social behaviour.

A review team has been set up to look at the difficulties members of the public are still experiencing when trying to contact Essex Police. This will also address the 999 issue, whereby calls intended for Essex Police are still being picked up by the Metropolitan Police. Another team is reviewing emergency response procedures.

Problem solving teams are to be set up in each area to address issues that are of concern to the public. Despite older people's fear of violent crime it is more likely that a victim will be male and in the 17 to 21 age bracket.

Letters were sent to all Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators earlier this year with the intention of reviewing and updating the scheme to improve communication between co-ordinators and police. Unfortunately, nearly 50% of co-ordinators did not respond and of those who did respond, 50% decided not to continue, which has left too few co-ordinators to make the Loughton schemes viable at present. The scheme has been put on hold until Inspector Piers Quinnell, our new Community Policing Team Inspector (who replaced Andy Loveridge with effect from 17 November) has settled into the post.

## SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE

Where in Loughton could you rent a video, get free internet access for an hour, buy a pair of reading glasses, send a fax and buy a birthday card – all in one place – and on a Sunday? Not many of us would think first of the Library, but these are just a few of the services which it has to offer – apart from a library's core duty of providing books and information.

Over the years, libraries have changed, and while books remain a major source of information, electronic sources are increasingly important. Loughton Library can give users free access to these new sources in a number of ways – it has a number of terminals which can be used to research the library's own material, and 14 terminals funded by the Government as part of the 'People's network' programme. These terminals can be booked for an hour and allow users to access the internet and e-mail, or programs such as Word, Excell and Powerpoint – the only charge is for printing. Anyone just starting with computers can get help from library staff who are qualified to give one to one training on Introduction to Computers, Internet or E mail at a cost of £10 for 1 hour

While electronic sources are growing, books are still a core source. Loughton Library is one of the larger branch libraries in Essex, and its stock should meet most needs, but if not, books can be brought from other Essex libraries, or through the inter-library loan scheme, from elsewhere in the UK or even abroad.

Children's needs are not forgotten – for pleasure the Library runs the Book

Maze reading programme which encourages children to read and comment on books, and has story readings by staff and authors. For schoolwork there are terminals in the Children's Library for homework, and national curriculum workbooks are on sale.

For those of an historical bent, the Library has a collection of local history material, with loan copies of some of the publications, and for genealogists – files of the local paper and all UK Parish records on microfilm.

The Library is a treasure house of information – and it is all there (mostly) for free, seven days a week. Plans are being drawn up to extend the services, for a reorganisation of the layout and for changing the opening hours, so that the Library would open 9.00 - 7.00 on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, Thursdays 9.00 - 1.00, Saturdays 9.00 - 5.30 and Sundays 11.00 - 3.00. There might be late-night opening on Wednesdays till 9.00 pm.

## DEPUTY TOWN CLERK

The Town Council has been taking some stick over the appointment of a Deputy Town Clerk, with complaints at the number of staff and their cost. Whatever one's point of view, it would have been helpful if the Town Council had made it clearer that it has not increased its staff – the Assistant Town Clerk resigned and the vacant post was regraded to that of Deputy.

The salaries paid to the Council officers are those of an agreed National Scale, with their place on the scale being set by the population served by the Council – Loughton's population of 30,340 makes it one of the largest Town/Parish Councils in the country.

The post was upgraded in order that the appointee could formally deputise for the Town Clerk, could assume the powers and responsibilities of the office (which an Assistant cannot do) and give greater assistance to the Town Clerk with strategic and financial matters.

Now that the Town Council has been awarded Quality Council status, it will be able to take over more responsibilities from the District Council, increasing the need for the senior officers to have financial and managerial experience. *Cllr. Suzanne Harper*

## LOUGHTON HALL'S FUTURE

Fears over the future use of Loughton Hall by community groups have been put 'on hold' since LRA Town Cllrs Chris Pond and Suzanne Harper put down a motion expressing concern about its current state. David Butler, the College Principal, addressed the Council and explained that a survey of the building for use as an adult learning centre had found that roof repairs costing some £250,000 would be needed and the College would be looking for sources of grants for the

work. Town Cllr Chris Pond welcomed the positive reaction from the College and hopes to set up a group of interested parties such as the County, District and Town Councils, Community Associations and other groups, which can decide the future use of the hall. The College supports this proposal and wishes to work in partnership with such a group to find funds which will preserve the building's character and make it fit for use by local people.

## TRAFFIC CALMING IN THE FOREST

The Conservators of Epping Forest have become increasingly concerned at the speed of traffic on the A104 and have been in discussions with Essex County Council. LRA County Cllr David Linnell, together with County Cllr Colin Finn (Con) arranged a meeting of the Friends of Epping Forest and the County Highways Department to discuss the proposals.

The Head of Highways said that his

department had excellent relations with the Conservators and accepted that the Forest was a special place which was subject to increasing pressure from traffic, so a traffic model and strategy for the Forest and surrounding area was being developed which could be ready for consideration by Essex CC in 2005. The strategy could then be incorporated in the Local Transport Plan, which would

help to find the funds to implement its recommendations.

Plans are being drafted for the 'calming' of the A104 from the County Boundary (south of the Warren Wood PH) to the Wake Arms roundabout, with the introduction of a 40mph speed limit on Rangers Road and the extension of the 40mph speed limit on the A104 from the County boundary to a point north of the Forest HQ at the Warren. The cycle lanes would be reinstated along either side of the A104, the central hatched area removed and replaced by a single white line, emphasising that the road is a two-lane only route.

The A104 would be de-restricted from the point north of the Warren to the approaches to the Robin Hood and to the Wake Arms where the 40mph limit would apply. Anti-skid surfaces would be installed at these points. Road modifications along the A104 at the Rangers Road junction, at the Warren, at each of the main pedestrian/ equestrian crossing points and at car parks/gateways would help to reduce speeds.

## NEW ROUTE TO ROMFORD

The Arriva Route 502 Loughton-Romford has been replaced by Route 202, which from 1 October runs from Waltham Cross to Romford via Loughton, Debden and Abridge. The 202 is operated by Locallink on behalf of Essex County. There will be three services a day on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays:



## AND WE THOUGHT IT WAS ALL OVER...

LRA District Cllr Peter House has been striving all year to get the drinking fountain working again and the Town Council has agreed to take it over, now

it only needs the water to be connected. BUT- it is now necessary for the District Council to transfer the title to the land upon which the Drinking Fountain stands to Loughton Town Council....simple?....no.

It now appears that the land was leased from the Parish of Loughton for 1000 years from 1871 (at the rent of 1 penny – if demanded). As the District Council does not own the land, the situation now really does become complicated, and for any progress to be made, it has to be shown that the land is not part of the highway, that the fountain is not a listed building, and that Loughton Town Council is willing to take over the fountain. Only then can a full description of the land, the terms and conditions of its use, with six copies of a coloured plan of the site be presented to the District Council for a decision on the transfer. Negotiations continue!



## MILLENNIUM REMEMBRANCE GROVE

The Town Council's Millennium Remembrance Grove, which was planted last year, has met problems – over 100 trees have died, some as the result of vandalism and some from natural causes. The Council has decided that rather than have a contractor replace all the lost trees at once, an annual budget will be set which will allow the gradual replacement of the initial losses, plus any others in future.

As the number planted each year would be limited, it would be possible for the Council's Parks and Amenities Warden to carry out the work. This would reduce the cost, and more trees could be replaced for the available funding. A gradual programme will also help to maintain the integrity of the original planting and to spread the cost over time.

## EXPANDING LRA

## YOUR COUNCILLORS AT WORK

*Parking* – District Cllrs Ken Faulkner and Peter House have surveyed the residents of Clifton Road, Forest Road and other areas where residents have no possibility of off-street parking, with the aim of finding a temporary solution to their parking problems. A permanent solution should come as a result of a District Council Parking Review, which will look at parking in Loughton's shopping area and adjacent roads, including a review of the 'yellow lines', the control of parking (possibly) through a combination of metered parking and residents parking in the roads off the centre. However, Loughton is third in line for the 'full treatment' after Buckhurst Hill and Epping, so a permanent solution may be some while. LRA Councillors Peter House and Ken Faulkner have urged the District Council Cabinet that the Loughton Parking Review should be brought forward. In particular, proposals to consult residents in Clifton Road, Forest Road, Meadow Road and Smarts Lane on managing parking in their roads - with the option of Residents Parking Schemes should be hastened.

*Road Safety* – Cllr Ken Faulkner has been successful in arranging for the final stage of the Church Hill road markings to be placed – yellow lines which will make non-parking areas obvious, and which will help to reduce the risk of accidents on this busy route.

The bus stop at the Ollards Grove/Old Station Road junction is to be moved a short distance south, away

from the roundabout to improve the traffic flow at the junction. The bus shelter will be outside the Almshouses, and will be a Heritage type, which will cantilever out into the footway, with its back against the Almshouses' wall, which should reduce the tendency of people waiting at the stop to sit on this wall. A number of residents are concerned that the stop affords an opportunity for people to lurk in wait for them (there has been an incident already), and County Cllr David Linnell will continue to look for an alternative solution.

*High Road* – District Cllr Tony Lee has arranged that the removal of the Giant Redwood from outside Woolworth's will be postponed until after Christmas, so it will carry Christmas lights for one more time. Unfortunately it will have to be felled early in the New Year because of the damage it is doing to drains.

Although we hope that the High Road will be enhanced in the not too distant future, we still have to use it in its present state, and District Cllrs Caroline Pond and Peter House have produced a lengthy survey of urgently needed repairs in the High Road and nearby roads, which has been sent to EFDC Highways.

*Loughton Town Council* has been awarded Quality Council status (only the fifth in the country to do so), and will now be able to take over further responsibilities from the District Council. LRA Town Councillors will be looking at the possibilities – including street

cleaning, litter and street furniture. If these and other responsibilities are transferred to the Town Council, we could look forward to a faster response to problems.

Following the continuing fiasco of the *Sainsbury's roadworks* (which largely came about because there was no overall project control), Cllr Ken Faulkner successfully proposed that, in future, the District Council should appoint its own project manager (paid by the developer) to oversee the site of any large development (such as M&S) which has effects on traffic or the public.

But meanwhile on the Sainsbury's roadworks - the contractors were meant to be returning to site in the week beginning 10 November to complete all outstanding matters – saying that they intended to complete these within three weeks, however, by 25 November, there was little visible sign of any progress. Essex County Highways Department had a follow up meeting with them arranged for the 27 November – one wonders what there could be to discuss!

## LOUGHTON'S COMMUNITY AND YOUTH CENTRE

There has been criticism of the Town Council's purchase of the former United Reform Church in Borders Lane to use the site for a Community and Youth Centre.

I would like to restate the vision which the Town Council had when the purchase was first suggested. This was that, in partnership with Essex County Council, a much-needed youth facility could be provided, together with a community facility for use by groups of all ages.

The process has been long drawn out, mainly through delays at Chelmsford, where despite the support of the appropriate portfolio holders, we had to negotiate a number of legal and procedural hurdles. However, while the County Council may be likened to a tortoise, it has arrived in the end, and the joint plan is now on its way.

The Town Council has agreed to proceed to the Scheme and Estimate stage, and has set up a new Community Centre Working Group to help move the project forward, reporting to Community Committee and Council as necessary.

I am pleased that this vision is now on the move, thanks to the Town Council's partnership with the Conservative-controlled County Council.

## A LIGHT AT THE END OF THE PATH

This a follow up to the continuing saga of the path from the new pool to Brooklyn Avenue, which has been a concern to all residents.

In February 2003 I contacted the Head of Leisure Services to enquire when the path would re-open as part of the refurbishment of the new pool. I was informed that due to security problems and the realignment of the footpath there would be a delay. I enquired again in March and May, and was told the council were in negotiations to purchase part of the end garden to take out the dogleg to make the path safer. The path had now been resurfaced and new lighting installed which now highlighted the collection of rubbish that had accumulated.

As nothing had happened in July I contacted Essex County Council to find out if it was a statutory Right of Way. It

is not, only an EFDC footpath. EFDC's Head of Leisure then informed me that it would be open by the end of August. After contacting the Council's solicitor at the end of September, it was now stated that the remaining work would start by mid October and the path should be re-opened at the end of the month - and it was !


