Brook Road/Brooklyn Avenue Potholes

Lee Scott, County Council cabinet member for Highways, has told LRA Cllr Chris Pond that all the road defects in Brook Road and Brooklyn Avenue were 'made safe' in early May. He was then immediately told by residents that the repairs were sloppy. He wants to say that Essex Highways are simply making holes (which were dangerous) safe again, and the repairs are not to make them elegant.

He and Chris both know the roads need resurfacing properly; a system is being brought in (Cllr Scott says) whereby Chris will be able to nominate them for surfacing. Details are awaited.

In the past there has been a (limited) funding pot that has enabled County Cllrs to nominate defects to be fixed (but only those in carriageways, not footways, which is a disadvantage) which LRA Cllr Chris Pond has taken advantage of. It is planned to continue this scheme in the current financial year, and the Council has been conducting a review of the scheme with <u>recommendations and comments here</u> (PDF).

Loughton Library Upper Floor Closed

A resident asked LRA Clir Chris Pond why the upper floor of the library had been closed, as it was much used by students for revision.

Chris took this up immediately with the County Council and was told the closure was due to much vandalism, and so asked for the situation to be urgently reviewed.

Loughton's Water Supply

Loughton residents suffered a failure of the water supply in mid-May for nearly 12 hours. This incident yet again showed water infrastructure locally is decayed and no longer robust.

And, of course, such supply failures can also disrupt traffic and bus services when roads need to be closed for emergency works.

There is now a (somewhat belated) recognition by the government and the regulator Ofwat that the problem is nationwide. Residents would have read news reports of increased investment by water companies in coming years to tackle storm overflows, increase water resilience and reducing nutrient pollution. At this point, the plans for the next two years do not appear to increase investment to improve the water infrastructure around Loughton.

In the meantime, what to do during water supply failures is on our website.

Future Schooling Needs in Loughton

LRA Cllr Chris Pond has been told that discussions are ongoing about providing extra space for the Oakview Special Educational Needs (SEN) school on a new site, not in Loughton. This was part of a webinar for Cllrs whereby it was learned that no new [non-SEN] school (primary or secondary) was forecast to be necessary in Loughton up to 2033. The estimates take into account housing allocations in local plans and may reflect LRA success in reducing the planned thousand new dwellings in Loughton to 455. Flats are estimated by experience to produce only 50% of new children on school rolls as houses.

Essex Bus Routes

The County Council is proposing to withdraw some bus routes that have low use and cost the Council at least £10 per passenger journey (<u>news article</u>). This includes bus route 804, which is the school bus that runs from The Broadway to West Hatch School.

The Council has a long standing value for money measure whereby it will not generally subsidise buses by more than £5 per passenger journey. This Council document (PDF) outlines the rationale for the withdrawal of some routes and the redesign of others.

LRA Cllr Chris Pond has suggested bus route 542 (which hasn't run since Christmas) and route 804 be redesigned together, and has discussed this with Lee Scott, County Council cabinet member for Highways. All proposals will be subject to consultation.

The Last Post, 227 High Road

Wetherspoons shut the pub on 14 May and returned the lease. A planning application has now been submitted to allow the vacant pub to be used as a restaurant, pub or a combination of the two uses. The new lessee has yet to be publicly named.



However there is past history of the pub using the delivery yard for tables and chairs, particularly after the relaxation of the first Covid lockdown where several local residents complained about noise and antisocial behaviour. The original planning permission secured this area by condition to be reserved for loading and unloading. The owners have applied for tables and chairs in this location in the past, the most recent being in 2020.

If the new planning application were approved, there would be no guarantee that the existing delivery areas near the pub will be available. The loss of the existing parking and delivery area would result in increased on-street parking and congestion within the vicinity of the site, to the detriment of the free-flowing traffic and safe operation of the High Road.

LRAPG has asked the council to impose conditions as per the original planning permission to cover the yard and the following areas:

 Restricting the side yard for servicing to prevent it from being used for tables and chairs and to prevent servicing from happening on the main road which blocks the traffic.

- · No takeaway food deliveries.
- The hours of opening restricted to 8am to 11pm each day.

A second application proposes to fill in the loading area on the side of the pub for an extension. LRAPG have objected to the extension which would result in the loss of the dedicated area for loading and unloading. The building should be free from side extensions to maintain its pure standalone setting on the High Road.

Reference EPF/0949/23. The formal consultation period ends 31 May.

10 Rectory Lane

This application proposes demolition of the existing commercial building and construction of a new building to provide five commercial units (including workshop, showroom and office space), together with parking and landscaping.



LRAPG have no objection in principle to the redevelopment and welcome the enhanced employment use. However, too many employment uses have been lost to residential under permitted development rights. LRAPG has therefore urged the District Council to enter into a section 106 (legal) agreement with the applicant to ensure the units do not flip to residential under permitted development rights after they have been completed. The planning statement says they originally wanted a residential use and LRAPG does not consider a planning condition is strong enough to protect the use and can easily be appealed against. Planning conditions have also been requested to restrict the parking spaces to the users of the development and ensure the cycle spaces are provided and retained.



In order to protect the amenity of residents on Golding's Hill, LRAPG has asked for the rear roof to be conditioned not to be used as a terrace and for the rear glazing to be obscured – mezzanine floors could easily be inserted without the need for consent that would result in overlooking without such a condition.

Reference EPF/0829/23. The formal consultation period ends 31 May.

- Clays Lane the road will be closed between Golding's Hill and Stanmore Way from 27 May to 8 July while scaffolding works are undertaken by BTS Group. More
- Oakwood Hill the road will be closed between Roding Road and Chigwell Road from 26 to 28 June for carriageway patching. More

Stay scam savvy by reading online reviews from reputable sources before booking any holidays and when renewing a passport, only use the government's official website. More fraud prevention advice from the police

Security Marking Your Property

You have a much better chance of getting things back if you've security marked your valuables and equipment (jewellery, TVs etc) and you've registered them on <u>Immobilise</u>, the free property-recording website that the police use to trace the owners of property they recover from thieves <u>More</u>

Immobilise is also the only ownership registration service supported by all UK police forces, the Greater London Authority, and the mobile phone industry.

Fines for Fly Tipping

The District Council has successfully prosecuted two individuals for fly-tipping offences with fines of £1500. More

The Council do not clear fly-tipping from private land (as that is the landowner's responsibility). However they do ask fly-tipping incidents on private land are reported so that they can investigate who is responsible.

Report incidents here

If you see someone fly-tipping:

• Do not approach them as they may react badly to being challenged

- Do not touch the waste or open containers as they may contain hazardous material
- Report it call the police if the offenders are still on site. After the event you
 can report the fly-tipping to the Council who will investigate to find out who is
 responsible.

County Council Electric Vehicle Charging Draft Strategy

The Council has drafted this strategy which aims for an accessible, reliable, easy-to-use, safe, and fairly-priced charging network, support communities with the socio-economic inequalities of using and charging an EV, and tackling the environmental priorities of reducing car travel and decarbonising vehicle emissions across the county.

There are only 300+ public EV charge points in Essex (below the national average) and 30-50% of Essex households do not have off-street parking so have no current (and legal) means of charging their car using their electricity supply.

of your local area. Did you know some libraries have historical maps of the area? You'll have to pop in and see them for yourself, as these are for in-library use only.



Can You Recycle Toothpaste Tubes or Wine Corks?

Increasingly you can recycle toothpaste tubes. but not necessarily in your home recycling as they have typically been made from a mixture of plastic and metal, to provide flexibility and help them hold their shape when squeezed. This makes them durable - and it's easier to squeeze every last drop out - but it also makes them a nightmare to recycle. Big manufacturers are working towards all their toothpaste ranges being recyclable by 2025. More

And wine corks should *not* go into the food and garden bin, but into your black bin.

Epping Forest

Wildlife and New Growth in the Forest.

Bird song is at its peak and if you've have ever intended to listen to the dawn chorus, May is the best time to set your alarm and head quietly off to the woods just before dawn breaks. To listen to the sounds of the night give way to the dawn chorus is a joy for the soul, an utterly privileged experience, not to be missed.

New growth abounds, with perhaps some of the loveliest being the bright green shoots appearing on the Forest's most venerable residents, the ancient pollards. It is amazing that an organism that spends the majority of its life in the slow lane, where its years equate to our minutes and hours, can go into turbo drive when spring arrives, producing an almost full canopy within days.

If you'd like to get to know some of the Forest's very special trees a little better and see the different forms that they take, Hatgate Plain (between Loughton and Theydon Bois) is an excellent place to start. Here you will find a community of trees, comprising mainly beech, hornbeam and oak. Many of the trees will quite probably be related, with parent trees, siblings, offspring and grandparent trees (and many generations) all present within metres of each other. More

Cost of Shopping Items

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) provides a <u>tool</u> allowing you to compare the average prices of over 450 items in the consumer prices inflation basket.

The tool contains items ranging from bananas to nursery fees and aims to help improve the accessibility of our existing data by easily allowing users to track average price trends. In the past year, 95% of these items have increased in price, with cucumbers (up 52%), olive oil (up 49%) and hard cheese (up 44%) seeing the largest increases.
