Demolition of Loughton Library

As reported in <u>our recent news special</u>, the County Council have now applied for planning permission to demolish Loughton Library on Traps Hill and replace it with a 5-storey block, now with a garage floor. <u>You can read LRAPG's letter of objection</u> here.

13 – 15A Alderton Hill Another proposed block of flats

As reported in <u>our recent news</u> <u>special</u>, there is a new planning application for demolition of



houses at 13, 15 and 15a Alderton Hill, which will be replaced by linked blocks of 89 elderly person's apartments.

The consultation period closed September 22nd. You can still comment to the Council. More details on our website.

New District Local Plan

We had expected a consultation on changes to the Main Modifications to the Local Plan to have started by now. However, it was announced at District Council Full Council meeting last Tuesday that it would start on October 31st.

There is no indication on what is causing the delay.

Progress with Potholes by Cllr Pond

As a result of LRA Chris Pond nominating potholes to repair, the following potholes are among those scheduled for repair (and may have already been fixed):

- · Castell Road 7 patches
- Shelley Grove outside No. 15
- · Forest Road outside No. 53 and No. 184
- · High Road outside the Methodist Church
- Oakwood Hill outside No. 45 and No. 50, and near the entre to the Industrial Estate
- Spareleaze Hill multiple ones (6)
- Traps Hill outside the Leisure Centre, opposite the Library and near Eleven Acre Rise
- Tycehurst Hill outside No. 14, No. 68, No. 88 and No. 97

Chris can report only potholes in Loughton Central county division.

Santa Claus is Coming to Town on The Broadway

The first Christmas event for many years on The Broadway will be a grotto for Santa in one of the offices where local children will be able to pay a visit. Funds are very limited but the aim is to provide a free new book to every child.

This will be on Friday December 2nd from 3pm to 5:30pm, and is organised by the Broadway Town Centre Partnership (BTCP), of whom LRA Cllr Rose Brookes is Interim Chair.

The BTCP are seeking donations of books now - can you help? You can support our local independent bookshop <u>The Bookshop</u> on the High Road who will be very happy to give suggestions for pre-school children, Key Stage 1 (5-7 years) or Key Stage 2 (7-11 years). These can be left, anonymously if you prefer, at the shop where Rose will be collecting regularly.

As we reported in <u>our previous news email</u>, the Local Government Boundary Commission (LGBC) for England was reviewing ward boundaries for the District. They have now published their <u>draft recommendations which are here</u>, along with how you can comment.

Broadly, all new District Council wards will elect 3 councillors each, with elections every year (with one year in 4 to be for County Council - the next one due in 2025).

- · St John's, Fairmead and Forest wards are greatly enlarged
- Alderton, Broadway and St Mary's wards are abolished
- Roding ward is enlarged but the old Roding ward south of Roding Rd to be detached and joined into a new Buckhurst Hill East and Whitebridge ward (mostly in Buckhurst Hill)

The proposals for Town Council wards are not yet clear.

LRA Comment: LRA is studying the proposed changes to determine the effect of how Loughton would be represented at the Town and District Councils and will be making formal comments to the LGBC.

7a Forest Road

This is an application for two storeys of office accommodation over this terrace of single storey commercial units.

LRAPG have objected to this overpowering development on the grounds the height, bulk and massing will stick out on this part of Forest Road to the visual detriment of Forest Road and this part of Loughton. In townscape terms the building forms part of a bigger unit with the adjacent shop; it would look ridiculous to extend only half of the site.

LRAPG is also concerned about the poor standard of drawings that are being accepted by the District Council. The plans submitted with this application are wholly inadequate to assess the quality of the design.

16 Station Road

It was very disappointing to see the original Rex Foster house demolished on Station Road, which we considered to be a local building of merit. Being situated outside a conservation area the District Council could not prevent this from happening. However, the loss of this asset should not mean the applicant should get away with the significantly larger dwelling which is now proposed.

LRAPG have objected to the excessive bulk of the proposed replacement dwelling which will sit uncomfortably on its plot and be out of character with this part of Station Road.

Tom Dick and Harry, 153 High Road

The restaurant has applied for provision of live and recorded music and non-standard timings for opening. The application was treated on its own merits and the following permissions were granted.

- Opening times are 8am-12:30am Monday to Wednesday, 8am-1am Thursday to Saturday and from 8am-11:30pm on Sunday.
- The sale of alcohol, which includes on and off sales, is 10am-mignight Monday to Wednesday, 10am-12:30am Thursday to Saturday and 10am-11pm Sunday.
- The provision of live music has been granted for both indoors and outdoors. Indoors from 10am-11pm Sunday to Wednesday and 10am-12:30am Thursday to Saturday. Outdoors, all live music must end when the outdoor seating area is to be cleared of customers which is 10pm Sunday to Wednesday and 11pm Thursday to Saturday.
- Provision of pre-recorded music for both indoor and outdoor areas is granted for 10am-midnight Monday to Wednesday, 10am-12:30am Thursday to Saturday and 10am-11pm Sunday.
- Provision of late night refreshments has been granted for both indoor and outdoors. Indoor hours are 11pm-midnight Monday to Wednesday and 11pm-12:30am Thursday to Saturday.
- Outdoor late night refreshment must end when the outdoor seating area is to be cleared of customers which is 10pm Sunday to Wednesday and 11pm Thursday to Saturday.
- For all of the above, non-standard timings for Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Eve, Bank Holidays have been agreed.

Planned Road Closures

- · Junction of the High Road and The Drive the area will have temporary traffic lights until October 15th to enable renewal of the traffic lights. Work is scheduled from 7pm to 5am with no noisy works after 11pm. More
- · Brooklyn Parade the road will be closed until October 28th for safety during work on the High Road by Essex Highways. More
- · High Road (south to Buckhurst hill) the road will be closed between 8pm and 5am from October 17th to October 22nd while

CCTV and drainage repair works are undertaken by the County Council. More Dates can change so check here for the latest updates, and for other planned roadworks including ones that involve only temporary traffic lights.



New parking restrictions on Baldwins Hill (pared down from the original proposal because of objections) will start on November 28th. These include:

- A Controlled Parking Zone (CPZ) from The Foresters Arms to No. 27
- Double yellow lines (no waiting at any time) from Golding's Hill to No. 58, and around the junctions of The Summit and Golding's Hill.

Roadworks in July

In Epping Forest District, County Highways made 57 repairs to roads, fixed 30 pavement defects, fixed 146 streetlights and cleared 2045 drains.

Council News

Loughton Day

The Town Council postponed Loughton Day during the official period of national mourning and tried to reschedule for October, but unfortunately this did not work out. They are extremely disappointed, as so much preparation work has gone into the organising of this inaugural 'Loughton Day'. They are now planning to relaunch the event next year.

District Council Budget

In <u>a report to the District Council Cabinet</u> (p25) there is a prediction of a £1 million overspend in the current financial year, due to reductions in income and higher cost pressures.

In <u>a separate report</u> (p3), for the next financial year the Council is projecting a £4 million deficit. With forecasted expenditure of £19 million and funding of £15 million, this is a significant gap. The Council have <u>been reported</u> as saying that 'services

which the council has a statutory requirement to provide would be prioritised, although they would be reviewed to try to make them more cost-efficient'.

The budget situation for all three councils (Town, District and County) is going to be very difficult this year.

County Council Support for Residents

A new raft of measures and money to help families battle against increasing cost of living pressures has been announced by the County Council.

The plans include £17 million of government cash to help households pay for insulation and other energy saving improvements at home, a community led 'winter warmth and welcome' campaign to provide local places for winter warmth over the coming months, including a grant scheme to help groups fund activities, and additional funding to help vulnerable people with essential costs.

A number of support initiatives are already underway with others due to launch in mid-October onwards. The <u>current support available is here</u> for energy bills, childcare costs, and household costs.

Sale of the Last Post pub

Wetherspoons have announced they have put the pub up for sale. This is one of 32 in the country they are trying to dispose of and are trying to lease it to another pub operator. Wetherspoons are well known for pruning pubs they consider not to be performing well for them. They currently have a lease until July 2023.

Regional Avian Influenza Prevention Zone Declared

A Regional Avian Influenza Prevention Zone has been declared by the Government for districts within Essex which include Chelmsford, Rochford, Tendring, Colchester, Maldon, Braintree, Basildon, Castle Point and the unitary authority area of Southendon-Sea. The zone also covers the whole of Norfolk and Suffolk.

The law now requires bird-keepers in these areas keep poultry and pet birds indoors.

Flu Vaccine

The flu vaccine is given free on the NHS to adults who:

- are 50 and over (including those who will be 50 by 31 March 2023)
- · have certain health conditions
- · are pregnant
- · are in long-stay residential care
- receive a carer's allowance, or are the main carer for an older or disabled person who may be at risk if you get sick
- live with someone who is more likely to get a severe infection due to a
 weakened immune system, such as someone living with HIV, someone who
 has had a transplant, or is having certain treatments for cancer, lupus or
 rheumatoid arthritis
- · are frontline health workers
- are social care workers who cannot get the vaccine through an occupational health scheme at work

Watch out - deer about!

With the autumn rut starting now, male fallow deer are becoming bolder and more noticeable with some beginning to establish their rutting stands by scraping the ground and urinating in their chosen spot. During the rutting season the deer may be more active and distracted than usual and therefore pose an increased hazard on the roads which run through the Forest woodland. Please take great care and keep to the 40mph speed limit.

If you hit a deer, Stop.

Call 999 if the deer is in the middle of the road. Deer may lash out and injure themselves you if you attempt move it. Here is more advice.

New Golden Hill Trail

A new waymarked trail in the Forest at Goldings Hill has been installed. The 1.6 mile circular route wends its way through woodland, passing many ancient pollards along

the way. It offers a detour to Baldwins Hill Pond as well as passing charming Golding's Hill Pond and the Lost Pond.

The Trail may be started and finished at any point along its length, with perhaps Goldings Hill Pond and Baldwins Hill being the most easily accessible.

Local business, Haslers Chartered Accountants, contributed to this and conservation work in and around Golding's Hill Pond.

Epping Forest Big Walk

The annual Epping Forest Big Walk returned this year on Sunday September 25th with over 200 people participating. Walkers were also able to properly relax on the route, without the need to look at a map or worry about directions, as they were led and supported by a group of volunteer walk leaders and marshals.
